

MY LONG PARIS LIST / BY DANIELLE RUBI

from north to south

THE RIGHT BANK

ABBESSES / MONTMARTRE

Take metro to metro Abbesses. walk around here and go up the little hilly streets to explore this area. A lot of terrace bars heading west on rue Abbesses. Walk around rue Lepic, this is where they filmed Amelie. It can be touristy in parts of this area so beware. Find a table for 'apéro hour', a very popular tradition in Paris where people gather at cafes between 5-8pm to share a plate of cheese and/or cured meats (fromage et charcuterie, assiette mixte) and a 'pichet' of wine.

The small street near metro Abbesses, has some nice little shops and if you continue uphill you will find some hidden terrace cafes and go get lost. This area and behind the Sacre Coeur (near Lamarck-coulincourt metro) can be enchanting. There is a great bar/restaurant on rue Burq, **Café Burq** which has a bohemian-chic atmosphere. Grab a glass of champagne here when you need to take a break away from the tourists in Place du Tetre. Place du Tetre is very much a sort of Disneyland version of what it once was - very shilacked and 'french'.

Its nice to also go up to the Sacre Coeur for the view and some good exercise as there are lots of stairs in this area. walk down the front of sacre coeur and to the left, at the base of it there are paris's most famous fabric stores. its fun to go into '**Dreyfus**' on the corner of St. Pierre and Livingstone. Its 6 floors high ...you wont miss it. Ive found some great deals on various cotton fabrics on one of the top floors. There is also **Tissues Reine** at #5 place St. Pierre. Just south of Abbesses and the Sacre Coeur is Pigalle, where the Moulin Rouge is. Can be a little scrappy around here but there is a lot of history as well. pick and choose. Close to this area is a charming little street, rue André del Sarte where **Chéri Bibi** is (#15), a great bar/restaurant with a mixture of 50's french decord and modern manhattan. A nouveau french menu.

South of Pigalle, in the 9th arrondissement, there are some pleasant places on rue des Martyrs, where there is the veg/vegan café **Rose Bakery** (#46) and lots of new little shops (and **vintage shops**) popping up in this up and coming neighborhood. Lots of people are moving to this area, as it's still 'true Paris' with small bakeries and shops, and is more affordable. A very "bobo" (bohemian/bourgeois) neighborhood.

CANAL ST. MARTIN

I recommend talking a walk around the canal st. martin and have lunch at **Chez Prune**, nearby is my favorite bakery called **Du Pain et des Idées**, fruit tarts, savory rolls, (all using old method baking) on 34, Rue Yves Toudic (closed on weekends). **A.P.C.** is across the street and is one of Paris's fave women's clothing stores. The canal is a perfect spot for having a picnic and good people watching too. There is a little bar **le Jemmapes**, 82 Quai de Jemmapes, there where you can get take-out beers or wine in plastic cups and then go hang on canal side. **Hotel du Nord**, 102 Quai de Jemmapes, has a nice terrace (and interior) here for wine also. To buy and taste organic wines, go to **Le Verre Volé**. It's a small wine bar with a small menu as well. 67 rue de Lancry . Way up the canal is **Bar Ourcq**, 68 Quai de la Loire, with a laid back atmosphere and little beach chairs canal side. Get on a vélib bike and trek up there. It's especially nice when the sun is out.

OTHER SPOTS IN THE NORTH AND NORTHEAST :

Parc des Buttes Chaumont: A hilly park with a lake. Lots of people go here on sunny days to play guitar with friends and have group picnics. When it's sunny in Paris, it's all about the picnic scene in parks, along the banks of the Seine and along the Canal St. Martin.

Pere Lachaise Cemetery: Lots of literary giants and famous artists are buried here

Bois de Vincennes: A Huge park with one of the only medieval chateaux's of France left. Take the line 1 metro to the end, at Chateau de Vincennes and walk around the incredible Chateau. Then walk south east to the Lac des Minimes where you can rent a little wooden row boat. You can walk for hours and there are farms, forests and the parc floral as well as tennis courts and little lakes, fields, and rivers throughout. Was once the King's hunting grounds.

MARAIS

Take a long walk around the marais neighborhood. Here is one suggestion:

Start at Republique (just south of the Canal St. Martin) and go down rue temple and hang a left at Rue Dupetit-Thouars. There is an art bookstore called **OFR** on your left hand side, check it. Further down Dupetit-Thouars there are a series of cafes that are good. We like the **Focaccaria** at #12 (excellent italian pizza) and also **Cafe Creme** further down. A nice cluster of terraces for people watching and chilling. no rush style. Also off the café street on 3, rue Charles-Francois Dupuis is **Goumanyat et son Royaume**. This is a FANTASTIC spice / tea store with everything gourmet to bring home. The morroccan spices are exceptional and the man who works there is a friendly specialist and likes to have you spell every spice in the store if you want;). Back at the end of the café street (its short) hang a right on Rue Picardie down to Rue Bretagne. Take a left on Bretagne and find the cute covered market called **Marché des Enfants Rouges** at the corner of Bretagne and Charlot. its nice to wander in there, again, an excellent spot for lunch with a great ambience.

Continue down Bretagne until you get to **le Progrés** at 1, rue Bretagne. a bar where we always run into friends and its another terrace bar with good people watching. It gets crowded with the fashion crowd sometimes but its fun there. *You dont have to walk this exact route or anything im just pointed out good spots as Im walking in my mind ;)* ... but yeah, after Progrés, go right on rue Vieille du Temple and continue down for good window shopping into the heart of the Marais. After you make that right turn there is a charming little fabric store where friend's like to buy some cute cotton (affordable) patterns for pillow cases, etc. It's called **IE** on 128 Rue Vieille du Temple. Great baby/children clothes here also. Continue to pass **APC** and lots of boutiques. On rue veille du temple, rue des archives and around there - explore. Eat lunch at the **Breizh cafe** on 109, Rue Vieille du Temple. They have the best crepes in town. They use the traditional buckwheat crepe for their savory crepes (gluten-free). You must try a salted caramel crepe and they also have a variety of traditional Breton cidre. Nearby, the best 5 Euro lunch at the famous **L'as du Fallafel** on 34, Rue des Rosiers. Its the best falafel ever. Rue des Rosiers is the jewish quartier with amazing bakeries and like I said, incredible falafel/schwarma etc.

When you reach the end of rue Vieille du Temple it turns into rue du Pont Louis-Philippe. Continue down Pont Louis-Philippe and on the right hand side find the little cobbled passageway (notice the medieval timber building looming above this passage) and enter the back door of one of my favorite quiet escapes,

the **Église Saint Gervais**. Walk and sit in the church and view the varied styles of stain glass and textures. Take a few minutes to feel the architecture do its job and elevate you to a dreamy state. When exiting the church (the same door you entered) take a right and you will be on a little street (rue des Barres) and there is a string of shops one of which is a store featuring all products (honey, herbs, tea, etc) produced in french monasteries. At the end of this little street and at the river, arrive at Chez Juilen , which is an old restaurant beautifully restored by the Costes bros.

Continue across the river and you will be on the Isle Saint Louis. Here there are the famous **Berthillon** ice cream shops. Then cross over to the other Isle , Isle de la Cite, on the pont st. louis. **Notre Dame** is here and spy on all the gargoyles. On the western corner of this Isle, is where you have to walk down to the banks where people hang out. There are access stairs around that end of the Isle. So many spots along the Seine to have some wine and a picnic on a sunny day. You must do this!

...ALSO IN THE MARIAS...

Contemporary art galleries: a few on rue St. Claude. & the **Emmanuel Perrotin Gallery** on 76 rue de Turenne around the corner from the St. Claude galleries.

The Pompidou Centre (contemporary art museum) over on rue Beaubourg with an incredible view from the top at their bar/cafe.

Jadis et Gourmande, 39 rue des Archives. Chocolate shop where you can buy individual letters in chocolate and spell whatever you want. Cool gift idea.

Musée de la Chasse et de la Nature (special museum focusing on the art of hunting in France and Nature with amazing displays not to be missed), 60, rue des Archives, Paris 3. M° Rambuteau. Closed Monday. €4.50-6.

Musee Carnavalet on the corner of rue Francs Bourgeois and rue Sevigne . A great place to start your trip in Paris as its a **free** history museum with a nice modern art section. Devoted to only Paris history.

BASTILLE

In the Bastille area (just off the main round-a-bout & metro stop) there is a wonderful farmer's market on weekends. It's the largest in Paris.

Near Bastille is Place de Vosges, a lovely square with arcade walkways with cafes and galleries. Find the secret passage way in one of the back corners and it will lead to a beautiful courtyard garden.

There is a good morrocan cous cous restaurant near Bastille called **Café Moderne**. Its on 19 rue Keller. Cous Cous has become a staple in Paris.

A good terrace bar near Bastille, is **Pause Café** on 41 rue de Charonne.

There is small bar, '**Tape**', which is more an indie rock tiny bar on 21 Rue de la Roquette.

Merci , 111 Boulevard Beaumarchais. Hands down, one of my favorite shops in Paris. They have a lot of great house items. Upstairs, go get some beautiful bed linens in great colors.

OPERA (1ST ARRONDISMENT)

Go inside the Opéra house! Just nearby is the **Repetto** shoe store. For the real parisian ballerina calf's skin leather flat, you should buy it from here. Nice soft leather and every color. 22 Rue de la Paix. Walking down rue de la Paix will bring you to the ever so elegant, Place Vendome. This is where the Ritz Paris is located. Go inside and look at the lobby's flower displays and use the restroom if needed... it's quite nice ;) My mother always insisted on using nice hotel restrooms when travelling.

Paris's famous department stores are on blvd Haussman. **Printemps** is on 64 boulevard Haussmann and **Galeries Lafayette** in next door. Nearby is the new 'it' store called Uniqlo, 17 Rue Scribe. These are all located just behind Opera.

There is a tiny 'japantown' near Opera on rue St. Anne. Here there are lots of amazing fresh japanese restaurants where it's like you are in Japan. Fresh noodles and dishes and lots of cheaper options for dinner/lunch. Adrian and I go here a lot as we love japanese food and it's a nice break from french cuisine. **Kunitoraya** is on 39 Rue Sainte-Anne (fresh udon and Kamodon-duck and egg on a large bowl of rice). **Higuma** is on 32 rue st. Anne and a block over on 14 Rue Chabanaise, is **Hokkaido** - which is our fave for the fixed menu dinners and fresh ramen/udon soups. Most places are a bit crowded but service is good and there is often a downstairs for more seating.

NEAR RIVER SEINE, LE CHAMP & AROUND THE LOUVRE / COUTURE SHOPS

Check out **Palais du Tokyo** for contemporary art across the river from the Eiffel Tower.

If you want to do the Champ Elysees (and look at the Arc de Triomphe and visit the lovely Parc de Monceau) you can also check out the flagship couture stores further south off le Champ on the famous Avenue Montaigne.

For nice Paris views, walk along the river to the Grand Palais and over to rue faubourg St. Honore. Do the 'st. honoré' (rue du faubourg st. honore turns into rue st. honore) walk if you want to look into the windows of every chic designer boutique in town on one long street. You will pass the **Lanvin** store (2 Rue du Faubourg St.-Honoré) , **Hérmès**, **YSL**, **Prada**, **Chanel** and everything in between (although the flagships for all french labels are on rue Montaigne).

There is a fantastic antique jewelry store called **Dary's**, it's on 362 rue St.-Honoré. Every peice in there has a story. I bough a belt buckle in there for my wedding dress:) . Also go check out **Colette** (one of the fashion/art/hip boutiques that set trends for the rest of the world) on 213 rue st. Honoré and zig zag over to the Tuileries Gardens and the Louvre.

Le Fumoir is a beautiful cafe behind the louvre on a quiet square: 6 Rue de l'Amiral de Coligny. Peek inside the **Church of Saint-Germain l'Auxerrois** which is situated at 2, Place du Louvre. A peaceful pause there is nice after all the walking and looking and thinking...

SNIPPETS OF GOODNESS IN THE 10TH & 11TH :

For evening bar scene check out **Chez Jeannette** on 7, Rue du Faubourg Saint-Denis. That's one of my hang outs and the people there are cool and there is usually good music on the speakers. sometimes djs. my sister did an impromptu show there recently. At ' apero hour ', a lot of people eat a plate of cheese with bread and wine or bread and charcuterie (cured meats,etc) . Jeannette has a good 'assiette' for apero hour (usually between 5-7). Ask if Hérvé is there and tell him Adrian and

Danielle sent you ;)

A nice spot for a special dinner is at the **Au Vieux Chêne** on 7, Rue du Dahomey. Its a little pricey and outside the center, but its amazing and the husband/wife owner are cool. This area is a favorite among locals and being a pleasant neighborhood. Just nearby here, Restaurants on Rue Paul Bert are incredible. A small street with a well liked seafood restaurant and across the street is an Argentinian steak restaurant, called **Unico**. Cute neighborhood. Metro: Faidherbe-Chaligny.

Near the Faidherbe neighborhood, go to **Le Pure Café**. This historic corner bistro is one of the most beautiful in Paris. It was featured in "Before Sunset" and is wonderful for an afternoon apéro or dinner. There is also a lovely front terrace on the street for wine and snacks. 14 Rue Jean Macé. Don't miss it ;)

OTHER RIGHT BANK SPOTS:

For a relaxed tea/coffee/hot chocolate and incredible tarts (famous for their tarte citron) and cakes is 'La Loir dans le Thiere' at #3 rue Rosiers.

Vegan/veg/gluten free : Rose Bakery, 30 Rue Debelleye. They have another location in the 9th too on rue des Martyrs.

Cute shop for tights and socks and mini socks for wearing ballerina flats: Tablio, 15 rue Vieille due Temple.

For incredible spices (morroccan and indian) and other gourmet cooking ingredients:
The spice market at the Gourmet Food shop at Galerie Lafayette
Goumanyat et son Royaume / 3 rue Charlies-Francois Dupuis (go here if you want to bring home some top quality spices and teas)

A great food market street: The rue Montorgueil, which has become a vibrant street lined with restaurants, food stores, chocolate shops, and lively cafés. The street is the perfect place go if have just a short time in Paris, as there's a lot to see—and eat, in a very concentrated space. Depending on where you're coming from, you can take the *métro* and get off at Etienne Marcel, Les Halles or Sentier. probably want to visit the nearby **restaurant supply shops**. The most famous is **E. Dehillerin**, Other shops are **Bovida, A. Simon, and MORA**. En route to rue Montorgueil, do not miss **G. Detou** (58, rue Tiquetonne), which is a fabulous baking supply shop, with lots of other French food specialties, all sold at fair prices.

Mariage Frères, 30 Rue du Bourg Tibourg. An old tea house and tea seller. A gorgeous tea house and shop (there is also a location on 13 Rue des Grands Augustins in the left bank).

All restaurants at the **Marche des Enfants Rouges** on rue Bretagne (near cross street rue de Picardie) are excellent and is open for lunch on Monday, Wednesdays, Fridays until 3pm (different stalls sometimes have different hours), and on Saturday all day. There is a great Japanese stall here as well as Moroccan, Italian, Libanese, and amazing sandwiches & crepes (made by the charismatic Alain).

THE LEFT BANK

One of my favorite all-time parks is the **Parc Luxembourg** in the 6th . This park is for relaxing and people watching. People with children hang out around the large formal pond where there are small boats with push sticks and pony rides near by. Often times there is a large scale public photo exhibition going on on the gates surrounding the park.

In the northern section of the 6th arrondissement, walk around Paris's fine arts school, **Ecole des Beaux-Arts** on 14, Rue Bonaparte and then continue down Rue de Seine where it's gallery after gallery and end up for lunch at **Cosi** on 54, Rue de Seine. Great fresh sandwiches (bread baked every ½ hour) for good prices.

If you want to hang out in one of the bars often featured in Godard & Truffaut films of the new wave... go to **Le Dix Bar**, 10 Rue de l'Odéon, near metro Odeon.

In the 5th, Rue des Ecoles has some of the old cinema houses where you can see an amazing selection of great films. Pick up the weekly 'pariscope' from any kiosk to see listings!! One of my favorite super classic brasseries is called '**Balzar Brasserie**' on 49 rue des Ecoles. Beautiful interior.

Take a long walk down Rue du Bac and towards the bottom of this street, visit **le Bon Marché**, 24 Rue de Sèvres. This is Paris's first department store, with an impressive food section.

The Rodin Museum, 77 Rue de Varenne, has a beautiful garden in the back where there are Rodin's sculptures scattered throughout. Sit down on a bench and soak it all in and feel the ambience of the small mansion and formal gardens. To relax in the back yard of Rodin's old studio for only 1 euro is worth going for.

For a morroccan tea and hamman (spa where you get rigorously scrubbed down and steamed up), go to the beautiful and popular (models and moms) **Grande Mosque** de Paris. It's on 39 Rue Geoffroy Saint-Hilaire. Here you can go inside the Mosque courtyard for mind tea and then choose to go in for a spa treatment if you choose. Its worth a visit for a little afternoon break (or just have a mint tea in the lovely courtyard) and it's near the lovely Jardin de Plantes.

The Jardin des Plantes (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Jardin_des_Plantes) has a beautiful greenhouse and a mansion where there is a natural history museum.

Down on blvd Montparnasse is where the classic old bistro / café's are. **Le Select, le Dome, Le Rotonde, La Coupole**, etc. This area had a golden age between 1900-1930. Artists, writers, and thinkers hung out around these cafes for hours on end...Hemingway, Satre, Simone de Bouvior, Man Ray, etc. This area was the ultimate. Sadly WWII dissolved this community... read this: <http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Montparnasse>
